The ULDB was Early This Year!

The Up the Lake Down and Back (ULDB) gala event was early this year, held on Saturday, June 23rd. Although temperatures in the week before this sailing feast were in the high 90's, on the day of the ULDB we experienced comforting temperatures and a nice breeze as planned by Sharon Martis our Vice Commodore and organizer of this NSC gathering, which is always our largest occasion during the sailing season. Thus, we avoided the August heat that sweltered previous ULDB's.

The racing portion of the ULDB is typically considered a casual and fun event, yet it seems the fleets are becoming more and more serious, and the competitiveness on the water has been getting interesting. In fact during the start of Racing Division, the first ever ULDB General Recall occurred. Greg and Judy Morrison expertly managed the registration, scoring and race committee duties. There were numerous boats out on the water enjoying the sailing, then most started the race. A utility pole was also complete through the Friends group to aid with raising and lowering our big boat masts. At this time the pole is rigged as a simple hoist. I recommend that we only use the pole with help and instructions from our club members working the launch and haul out assistance. The pole will help even on simpler setups like the Flying Scots. Once Albrecht and I finish measuring the J-24 rig we will have a gaff rig (derrick arm) to do a more complex mast hoist. The pole was donated by Universal Electrical in Souderton, PA. The Friends group through donations from our club and the Windward club supplied the funds to purchase the winch and cable setup.

My last topic is (6) six Sunfish sailboats. NSC has signed a lease from the park to use the boats through the sailing season. The champagne bottle was broken across the bow on Labor Day. The rain clouds for the day supplied the champagne. Four skippers were soaked from a fun hour of sailing. Glenn W and Diane P documented the event in picture. We will work on a Borrowed Boat Program over the off-season so all members will have an opportunity to use the boats.

The regatta has been traditionally held at Marsh Creek, but their lake will be lowered this fall for maintenance.

From there the boat was brought home again to maintain our presence in the Flying Scot Saturday Series at NSC only to return to Avalon to compete in an offshore fun race to "The Lump", but that race was ultimately canceled when a storm blew in just as the fleet prepared to embark. Our next race was the annual "Avalon Cup" that too was postponed due to stormy weather but on the next day calm sunny conditions prevailed and Sam and I scored yet another perfect day with all bullets in the four races sailed.

Our Flying Scot was brought home once again this time to maintain our presence in the Flying Scot Sunday series at NSC only to be immediately returned to Stone Harbor where we would compete in the final inter-club series between YCSH and Avalon. This series had special meaning for both clubs in that it originated to award competition among club Comets and Cheetah-Cats as early as the 1950's only to be dormant for the last 20 years. And now that Avalon Yacht Club has a burgeoning Flying Scot Fleet (two and counting!) it was resurrected by the Admiralty of the two clubs to recognize and support this growing trend, and being members of AYC allowed us to participate in the effort to keep the cup. So, going in we were tied with the Nicholson's of YCSH but on that windy day yet another Stone Harbor team finished with all "1"s to make it a 3-way tie (with NSC member and heavy-air lover Phil Berger next in line all the way). In the end the 3-way tie was settled with a tie breaker rule and the trophy was passed to YCSH for this year, congratulations to all who participated in this great series, and to the future growth of Flying Scot sailing on the Seven Mile

So after a good bath our Flying Scot has returned home to complete the remainder of the sailing season in our beautiful, temperate, fresh water lake. In all we embarked on no less than 8 sorties this summer packing and rigging the boat, all without showing any signs of wear or complaint. Our Flying Scots are built to travel, and travel we did, and brought back with us a few awards, some new skills, and an encyclopedia of memories that will keep forever.

Book Review - by Jim Trinisewski (Thistle #3456)

"The Code of Competition" by Stuart H. Walker, ISBN 978-0-9703571-1-3, copyright 2009

If you are content finishing in your usual position – no need to read this book. However, if you would like to improve your standing, then this is a "must read" especially for those who have never participated in organized sports. But winning may result in other issues you will have to face. How would you feel? You may be very surprised! Stuart explains it all in great detail with many examples.

The Code of Competition evolved during the formation of packs by early man and it is believed that genetics has passed characteristics down to their descendents helping to insure that primitive packs continued to survive. Un-



derstanding the Code of Competition and how it can affect you can be just as important to your racing success as skills and equipment. I believe that the Code of Competition is at work in other parts of our lives such as work and group relationships. The Code also influences other sports. Stuart gives many examples from baseball, golf, tennis and others.

The section titled (Play defined-Child/Adult) page 184 is a good explanation of how competition enters our life as we age, from children playing at home to adults racing sailboats.

Be aware that many uncommon words are used in this text but by the time you finish the book you will understand them. Some of these are: atone, hubris, altruistic, egoistic, dogma, sublime, ambivalence, precepts, prowess and usurp. I doubt that I will use these words again very much.

There are Code Competitors and True Competitors. Code competitors are influenced by the Code whereas True Competitors don't follow the Code and think about only one thing – VICTORY. What type of competitor are you? If it is victory that you desire, then the information in this book may help to get you there. Good for 2013 Membership...
