Rear Commodore of Racing— Gary Bonner

The racing season got off to a slow start this year. In an effort to increase the likelihood of good racing conditions for the frostbite series, we attempted to be flexible with the race days, choosing the best day—Saturday or Sunday—based on the weather forecast. We apparently weren't able to be flexible enough, though, as poor conditions still prevailed on the first two race days as well as the alternates. Instead of the summer-like conditions of some years past, those who pulled the winter covers early this year were greeted with cold rain and canceled races. Racing in earnest finally began on May 1st, with 10 boats on the line for what was supposed to have been the third race day of the frostbite series. Hopefully, the weather will be more cooperative for the balance of the series in the fall.

Bad weather also quashed fleet racing on May 15, but the two May invitational regattas came off without problems, with Brent and Barb Benson taking the May 7th Invitational Regatta, and Paul Prozillo winning the Victor Jaczun Regatta. The weather turned the corner in June and we've had racing every weekend so far, most recently with Dan Reasoner winning the June 18th Invitational Regatta. July has a full calendar as well, with fleet racing on the 2nd, 16th, and 31st; an invitational regatta on the 9th; and the ULDB on the 23rd, details of which you will find elsewhere in this issue.

Hilltop Productions- Videos

This is an article not on how to do videos the right way, how to produce videos but more just a short article on the fun I am having making videos of my sailing on Lake Nockamixon. I thought over the winter should I purchase more sailing instruments to help my racing, should I put out hundreds of dollars on the Velocitek, record the races and review them later to see the courses sailed. Would it be cool? Sure. Then I noticed Les B on his catamaran with a camera. Phil E and Jim B were using cameras on their Santanas. Now this may be a cooler tool. Camera #1, PlantCam. It records video and stills in time lapse modes. Recorded a few sessions over the winter - Diane P's Precision in the driveway during a snow storm and the solar panels turning during a solar day. Okay it can work. Be what would be better - sound! Phil E and Jim B liked there GoPro Hero. It is HD and can record long 3GB video files or about 3 to 4 hours straight.

With files in hand, editing was next. The files are MP4 format. Movie Maker needs a different format. YouTube can convert to avi or wmv formats. Adobe Elements can read MP4 direct and save in avi format. Basically I review the hours of video in MP4 format, mark times I wish to use in a video and then enter Abode to clip out the waste. The output file is then edited in Movie Maker adding titles and overlays and saving in a compressed format small enough to post and minimize a file size while giving good quality. Sounds like a lot to do - but the tool is not only cool but a learning tool. This was the goal I set and achieved. Following Sea - Eric & Kathy Heck

Since purchasing our ComPac 19 - *Red Stripe* last year, Kathy and I have shared with many of our NSC friends our 5 year plan to sell everything that has or needs a foundation or roots and transition to a live aboard lifestyle. The next waypoint on that sail plan came sooner than expected and we purchased a 1999 Island Packet 380 - (Soon to be renamed *Following Sea*) over the Memorial Day Weekend. She's slipped in Annapolis for the season. A little crazy maybe, but we are sailors, it's what we do! Being a two boat family, I have been unable to devote the appropriate amount of time to being NSC Event Captain but Craig T has graciously steped up to take on that role. Thanks Craig!

Last Saturday, Kathy and I spent our first weekend on the hook on *Following Sea*. While we were missing our NSC friends, the Raft up and Moon light sail, we were overjoyed to be under sail and we knew we were sharing that feeling with our friends who were on Nockamixon that same night. While on different water, we shared the same sailing spirit. So, why do you sail and what does it feel like to be under sail? For me, having passed this next waypoint on our way to the sailing life, this is what it's like for me to be under sail:

Under Sail

Chasing a dream and Following Sea Setting sails sets our spirits free. My mast lifts the main from its sleepy domain as the Jenny unwinds with its own rise and shine.

Overjoyed and under sail heeling well with water washing the rail. My wake is awake and the bow takes a bow while the stern in return takes it's turn.

Sails reaching for a downhill run snap to attention above a starboard stanchion. My bow sprint nodding yes, galloping ahead of a head sail now full and looking well wind fed.

Overjoyed and under sail heeling well with water washing the rail.


