The next navigational beacon we set sail towards was to design a fleet flag. Our idea was to incorporate the identifying colors from each boat in our founding fleet into our flag. During the NSC sail club banquet, the fleet reviewed a design draft and shortly afterwards commissioned our fleet flag from seattleflagmakers.com. With visions of flying flags dancing in our spreaders, they arrived 2 weeks before Christmas, just in time for the ComPac Fleet Holiday Dinner at The

Cactus Grill. With smiling faces and dreams of spring sailing we enjoyed a fleet flag photo opp while looking forward to flying our fleet colors in 2011.

Racing Fleet Champions 2010 Craig Tourtellott

The NSC Racing Champion is determined annually from 15 races in the NSC Championship Racing Series. The winner is awarded the NSC Championship "CUP."

From 1975 to 2003, the NSC "CUP" was awarded to the winner of the Championship-of-Champions ("C-of-C") Regatta. This regatta was a oneday event held at the end of the season with races between the top two sailors from each of the fleets in the club. In 2004, the club revised the format so that the club champion was determined from the 15 races held on seven dates throughout the year, which includes all of the NSC Invitational Regattas.

Our 2010 NSC Championship "CUP" winner is Dan Reasoner on Thistle #2940. Dan has won the title three years in a row. This ties the record of Craig Tourtellott who also won the title three years in a row back in 1991, 1992 and 1993. Dan sailed in each regatta in 2010 sailing against great competition like Paul Prozzillo who trailed Dan in the championship by only 7 points. The championship in 2010 was to be decided between two skippers. Congratulations to all that helped make the regattas a success and to all that stayed on course to give Dan great competition.

Portsmouth Fleet Report

Portsmouth Fleet for 2010 ended a season with new beginnings. The Portsmouth fleet has been around since 1974! What the fleet started this year was an invitation to all members of NSC to race with the fleet - cruising members and racing members alike. To help a non-racing member try sailing around a race course, the fleet hosted open racing to all members.

For only \$10 a skipper and crew could register to sail on five race days. Several cruising members of NSC tried the experience. In the Saturday Series Mike Freund on his Precision 23 sailed solo to score 7th position. Best finish was a 1st on the 28 August date. Bill Hall on his O'Day 222 in the Sunday Series not only scored two 1st place finishes but was also awarded a 3rd place trophy at the Awards Banquet. Bill tied Warren Mangan in the Series with 25 points. Warren had one more 1st place finish to break the tie. Other skippers that joined the fleet were David Greenberg, Diane Paxton, Marsha Cooper, Joe Cehlar and Steve Carr.

Flying Scot Fleet Report

21 Flying Scot sailors celebrated the past season at the NSC Awards Banquet where the Fleet Awards for the 2010 were presented by Fleet Captain, Mike Mandell. The 2010 Fleet activities were also reviewed at the Banquet. NSC Commodore, George Balas, and Fleet Captain, Mike Mandell, presented a special "Lifetime Achievement" Award to Fleet Secretary Mike Noone, for which he felt greatly honored and extremely grateful. This Award was originally presented to Mike by Len Evelev at the Fleet Picnic this past August, and Mike

2010 Flying Scot Fleet Season Summary:

33 Flying Scot skippers participated in Fleet Racing at our Lake in 2010.

- 25 Flying Scots competed in the Challenge of the Lakes Series.
- 20 Flying Scots competed in the Fleet Regatta Series.
- 19 Flying Scots competed in the Fleet Saturday Series.
- 18 Flying Scots competed in the Sunday Series.
- 8 Flying Scot Teams competed in the Wife-Husband Series.

10 Skippers qualified for the Fleet Championship by sailing in at least 20 races.

The competition was great in all Series, and the winners were often determined by the results of races on the last day. Competition in the 2010 Regatta Series was particularly good, and the winner of that Series was determined on the last day -- by only 2 points after 19 races! There was always great, and close, competition within the fleet on every race date, and 8 different skippers won races during the year. A total of 45 Fleet Races were completed in 2010 with an average of participation over 10 skippers on every race day.

Fleet # 163 hosted the 2010 NJYRA Flying Scot Championships at our Lake -- the first major event that we have ever hosted -- and Fleet # 163 Teams have won the NJYRA Flying Scot Championships for the past 2 years -- the fleet plans to try to make it 3 in 2011?!

The Nockamixon Flying Scot Fleet was represented at ALL of the FSSA National Championship events in 2010 -- a new record for the Fleet. We had Fleet Teams at the Midwinter's, North American's, Atlantic Coast's, and Wife-Husbands Championships, and at the Sandy Douglass Memorial Regatta. SIX Fleet boats sailed in the ACC's -- the largest Fleet at the Regatta -- and another New Record for our Fleet.

In the 2010 NSC Frostbite Series, our Commodore and former Flying Scot Fleet Captain, George Balas, with Rich Baucom as crew, showed how the Scot could perform in good breezes by winning the Series sailing in FS # 1892, "Silver Girl" -- great job George and Rich!! Flying Scot sailors took the top 3 places in the 2010 Frostbite Series with Glenn Wesley in second place, and our Current Fleet Captain, Mike Mandell, in third. says is, without doubt, the most impressive trophy that he has ever received. It was another great honor to have the chance to be recognized again, before the entire Club, at the Banquet.

Mike and Brenda Noone were also presented with the 2010 Fleet Championship Trophy -- for yet another year! This makes 17 times in the past 21 years that the Noone Family has won the Flying Scot Fleet Championship -- enough is enough! The Noone's will not be competing for the Fleet Championship in 2011 -- some new names will be on the John Noone Memorial Trophy in the future.

Thistle Fleet Report

At the 2010 Nockamixon Sail Club Awards Banquet, which was held on November 13, Dan Reasoner was crowned 2010 Thistle Fleet Champion. This is the third consecutive year that Dan has won the Fleet Championship. He has a score of .875 out of a possible 1.000 and he participated in 87.5% of the races. Craig Smith was in second place for the series and Paul Prozzillo was in third place. See complete scores below. There were a total of 24 fleet races which were spread over 9 fleet race days. There was an average of 7.6 Thistles at each event and 14 skippers completed at least 1 fleet race. Seven skippers qualified for the Thistle Fleet Championship by completing at least 12 of the 24 races.

It is fitting that Dan has won the Fleet championship this year because he has been very active in both Thistle Fleet Racing and in Nockamixon Sail Club events. In addition to Thistle Fleet Champion, he received several other racing awards at the NSC banquet.

Also at the banquet, the Thistle Fleet Recognition Award was presented to Warren Rosen for his outstanding commitment to the Thistle Fleet in 2010. He participated in 95.8% of the fleet races (23 of 24), attended several regional Thistle regattas, and came to one of the "team racing" events that were run by the Thistle Fleet.

The Thistle fleet had about 20 members who attended the NSC banquet in November which also served at the 2010 Fleet Annual Meeting. At the meeting the 2011 fleet officers were elected. Dan Reasoner was elected as the new fleet captain and Tim Theisen was re-elected as the fleet treasurer.
